## Organized Retail Crime vs. Shoplifting

- Intent: Shoplifting is typically for personal use, while ORC is for resale and profit.
- Scale: ORC involves large quantities of merchandise, while shoplifting is often a smaller amount.
- Cooperation: ORC involves groups, while shoplifting is usually done by a single individual.

## Key Aspects of ORC

- <u>Coordinated and planned</u>: ORC is not random; it involves planning, coordination, and often multiple individuals.
- <u>Large-scale theft</u>: ORC involves stealing significant quantities of merchandise, often with the intent to resell.
- <u>Financial gain:</u> The stolen goods are usually resold to make a profit, often through fencing operations or online marketplaces.
- <u>Criminal enterprise</u>: ORC is often connected to larger criminal networks, including drug trafficking and human trafficking.
- <u>Vulnerability exploitation</u>: ORC groups exploit vulnerabilities in the retail supply chain, such as lax security or weak inventory control.
- <u>Impact on retailers and consumers</u>: ORC has significant financial consequences for retailers, leading to increased costs and potentially higher prices for consumers.

#### Growth of ORC

- "Retailers reported a 93% increase in the average number of shoplifting incidents per year in 2023 versus 2019 and a 90% increase in dollar loss due to shoplifting over the same time period."
  - National Retail Federation & Loss Prevention Research Council, 2024
- While theft undoubtedly affects retailer margins, the surge in violence associated with these crimes has become a major concern. Retailers' top priority is to ensure the safety of both associates and customers.
  According to "The Impact of Retail Theft & Violence 2024" report by the NRF, 73% of retailers reported that shoplifters have become more aggressive and violent over the past year, with 84% expressing heightened concern about the violence occurring during theft incidents.

## The Impact of ORC

- "In 2022, retailer losses, or shrink, amounted to nearly \$100 billion dollars in the USA, of which organized retail crime is a significant driver."
- Loss of 2023 Tax Revenue in Colorado = \$139,810,700
  - U.S. Chamber of Commerce, March 15, 2023

- <u>House Bill 1147</u> by Reps. Mabrey/Velasco Vetoed by Gov Polis Fairness & Transparency in Municipal Court
- Senate Bill 70 by Senators Roberts (D) & Liston (R) Passed
  Online Marketplaces & Third-Party Sellers
