7	AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE CONCERNING
8	AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE CONCERNING
9	THE CORONAVIRUS (COVID -19) PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY
10 11	WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020 Jared Polis, the Governor of the State of Colorado,
12	declared a statewide state of emergency in response to coronavirus (COVID-19); and
13	declared a state wide state of emergency in response to coronavirus (CO vib 17), and
14	WHEREAS, the World Health Organization has declared the coronavirus (COVID-19) to
15	be a worldwide pandemic; and
16	
17	WHEREAS, the coronavirus (COVID-19) has been confirmed to exist in Summit
18	County; and
19	
20	WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Breckenridge confirms that protecting
21 22	public health is the Council's top priority; and
23	WHEREAS, the Town Council is empowered by Section 31-15-401(1)(b), C.R.S., to do
24	all acts and make all regulations which may be necessary or expedient for the promotion of
25	health or the suppression of disease; and
26	neutri of the suppression of disease, and
27	WHEREAS, the Town Council finds and determines that the adoption of this ordinance is
28	necessary for the promotion of health and the suppression of disease; and

30	WHEREAS, the Town Council further finds and determines that the adoption of this
31	ordinance is proper under Section 31-15-401(1)(b), C.R.S., and other applicable law.
32	NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORD A RIED BY THE TOWN COLUMN OF THE TOWN OF
33	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF
34 35	BRECKENRIDGE, COLORADO:
36	Section 1. Title. This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Town of
37	Breckenridge Coronavirus (COVID-19) Ordinance."
38	Breekemings Coronavinus (CO vib 17) Cramance.
39	Section 2. Intent. It is the intent of this ordinance to provide the necessary organization,
40	powers, and authority to enable the timely and effective use of all available Town resources to
41	prepare for, respond to, and recover from the declared local public health emergency. This
42	ordinance is intended to grant as broad a power as is permitted within the letter and spirit of the
43	Town Charter and the Council-Manager form of government, and this ordinance shall be
44	interpreted in accordance with such intent. The Town Council retains the power to direct the

Town Manager during the pendency of the current coronavirus (COVID-19) public health emergency.

Section 3. Public Health Emergency Declared. The Town Council hereby declares that a public health emergency relating to the coronavirus (COVID-19) exists within the Town. Such circumstance is referred to in this ordinance as the "public health emergency." The public shall be notified of this declaration through general dissemination to the news media, posting on the Town website, or other means of publicity intended to advise the general public.

<u>Section 4.</u> <u>Duration of Declaration of Public Health Emergency</u>. The declaration of the public health emergency as provided in Section 3 of this ordinance shall remain in effect until the Mayor declares that the emergency has passed.

<u>Section 5.</u> <u>Continuity of Government</u>. Section 15.8 of the Town Charter concerning continuity of government shall apply, if circumstances warrant, during the duration of the public health emergency.

<u>Section 6.</u> <u>Powers</u>: Until the Mayor declares that the public health emergency has passed the Town Manager has full power and authority to take the following actions and issue the following orders:

- (a) any action necessary for the protection of life and property, including, but not limited to, establishing regulations governing conduct related to the cause of the public health emergency.
- (b) an order establishing a curfew during such hours of the days or nights and affecting such categories of persons as may be designated.
- (c) an order to direct and compel the evacuation of all or a part of the population from any stricken or threatened areas within the Town if the Town Manager deems this action is necessary for the preservation of life, property or other public health emergency mitigation, response or recovery activities and to prescribe routes, modes of transportation and destination in connection with an evacuation.
- (d) an order controlling, restricting, allocating or regulating the use, sale, production or distribution of food, water, clothing, and other commodities, materials, goods, services and resources.
- (e) an order requiring the closing of businesses deemed nonessential by the Town Manager.
- (f) suspend Town board and commission meetings to include, but not be limited to, meetings of the Planning Commission, Breckenridge Open Space Advisory Commission, and Liquor and Marijuana Licensing Authority, or modify meeting rules to allow for telephone, teleconferencing or meeting by other electronic means.
- (g) appropriate and expend funds, execute contracts, authorize the obtaining and acquisition of property, equipment, services, supplies and materials without the strict compliance with procurement regulations or procedures.
- (h) transfer the direction, personnel, or functions of Town departments and agencies for the purposes of performing or facilitating public health emergency services.
 - (i) utilize all available resources of the Town as may be reasonably necessary to cope

with this public health emergency whether in preparation for, response to, or recovery from this public health emergency.

- (j) suspend or modify the provisions of any ordinance if strict compliance with such ordinance would in any way prevent, hinder or delay necessary action in coping with this public health emergency.
- (k) accept services, gifts, grants and loans, equipment, supplies, and materials whether from private, nonprofit or governmental sources.
 - (1) .make application for local, state or federal assistance.
- (m) terminate or suspend any process, operation, machine, device or event that is or may negatively impact the health, safety and welfare of persons or property within the Town.
- (n) delegate authority to such Town officials as the Town Manager determines reasonably necessary or expedient.
- (o) limit the use of any Town-owned building, facility, or property as to time, manner, and permitted activities, including, but not limited to, limiting the permissible number of people that may lawfully occupy such building, facility, or property at any one time.
 - (p) close and prohibit the use of any Town-owned building, facility, or property.
- (q) exercise such powers and functions in light of the exigencies of this public health emergency, including, but not limited to, the waiving of compliance with any time consuming procedures and formalities, including notices, as may be prescribed by law pertaining thereto.
- (r) issue any and all other order or undertake such other functions and activities as the Town Manager reasonably believes is required under the circumstances to protect the health, safety, welfare of persons or property within the Town of Breckenridge, or to otherwise preserve the public peace or abate, clean up, or mitigate the effects of the public health emergency.

The restrictions may be changed from time to time during the time frame of the declaration based upon the discretion of the Town Manager.

Section 7. Enforcement Of Orders:

- (a) The members of the Town's Police Department, code enforcement, and such other law enforcement and peace officers as may be authorized by the Town Manager are herby authorized and directed to enforce the orders, rules, and regulations made or issued pursuant to this ordinance. All members of the public shall be deemed to have been given notice of all orders, rules, and regulations made or issued pursuant to this ordinance upon their dissemination to the news media or publication on the Town website or other means of publicity.
- (b) Until the Mayor declares that the public health emergency has passed, no person shall:
- (1) enter or remain upon the premises of any establishment not open for business to the general public, unless such person is the owner or authorized agent of the establishment.
 - (2) violate the provisions of this ordinance.
- (3) violate any of the orders duly issued by the Town Manager or designee pursuant to Section 6 of this ordinance.
- (4) willfully obstruct, hinder, or delay any duly authorized Town officer, employee or volunteer in the enforcement or exercise of the provisions of this ordinance, or of the undertaking of any activity pursuant to this ordinance.

(c) It is unlawful and a misdemeanor offense for any person to violate any provision of this Section 7. Any person convicted of a violation of this section shall be subject to the penalties set forth in section 1-4-1 of the Breckenridge Town Code.

Section 8. Authority To Enter Property: During the period of the public health emergency, a Town employee or authorized agent may enter onto or upon private property if the employee or authorized agent has reasonable grounds to believe that there is a true emergency and an immediate need for assistance for the protection of life or property, and that entering onto the private land will allow the person to take such steps to alleviate or minimize the emergency or disaster or to prevent or minimize danger to lives or property from the declared public health emergency.

Section 9. Town Council Meetings And Departments:

(a) For the duration of the public health emergency, if a Town Council member reasonably determines that his or her personal attendance at a Town Council meeting would not be prudent, such Council member may listen by telephone, video conferencing, or other electronic means to any Council meeting ("Electronic Participation"). Such Council member listening via telephone or other electronic means shall be deemed present for purposes of determining a quorum. The member of Town Council may not participate nor vote in a quasijudicial public hearing; however, the Council member may maintain the electronic connection and monitor and listen to the hearing. The member of Town Council may participate and vote in legislative matters. Electronic Participation is also available to a Town Council member during an executive session. The Town Council may discontinue the use of Electronic Participation by one or more members during a meeting where the participation results in delays or interference in the meeting process; e.g., where the telephone connection or connection by other electronic means is repeatedly lost, the quality of the connection is unduly noisy or otherwise problematic to the conduct of the meeting, or the listening member is unable to hear speakers using a normal speaking voice amplified to a level suitable for the meeting audience in attendance. Whenever a Town Council member is allowed to participate in a Town Council meeting by telephone or other electronic means pursuant to this Rule, the following additional rules shall be observed:

 (1) All members of the Town Council must be able to hear one another or otherwise communicate with one another, and be able to hear all discussion and testimony in a manner designed to provide maximum notice and participation;

(2) Members of the public present at the meeting location must be able hear all discussion, testimony, and votes;

- (3) All votes held at the meeting shall be conducted by roll call.
- (4) To the extent possible, full and timely notice shall be given to the public setting advising that one or more members of the Town Council may participate in the meeting electronically.
- (5) Participation in a regular Town Council meeting by telephone or other electronic means in accordance with this Rule shall not be considered to be a "failure to attend" a regular Council meeting for determining whether a vacancy in the office of the Mayor or a Council member has occurred under Section 4.8(b) of the Town Charter.

(b) Whenever the public health emergency makes it imprudent or impossible for Town Council, or any Town board, commission, or committee, to meet at a previously scheduled date and time, such meeting shall be deemed to be postponed until a quorum of the Town Council or Town board, commission, or committee is able to meet, not to exceed one (1) week.

- (c) Any official act or meeting required to be performed at any regular location of the Town Council board, commission, or committee or any Town department is valid when performed at any temporary location under this section.
- (d) The provisions of this section shall apply to all executive, legislative ,and judicial branches, powers and functions conferred upon the Town and its officers, employees, and authorized agents by the Colorado Constitution, Colorado Statutes, the Town Municipal Code, including the Town Charter.
- Section 10. Access To Tabor Funds: During the current public health emergency the Town Manager shall have access to the Town's emergency funds mandated by the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR) as set forth in Article X, Section 20, Subsection (5) of the Colorado Constitution ,entitled "Emergency reserves." Funds utilized pursuant to this ordinance shall be replenished no later than the conclusion of the fiscal year following the end of the current public health emergency.
- <u>Section 11.</u> Conflict With Other Laws: If any provision of this ordinance conflicts with the Town Charter, the Town Charter shall control. If any provision of this ordinance conflicts with any provision of the <u>Breckenridge Town Code</u>, or any provision of the Town Council's Procedures and Rules of Order, this ordinance shall control.
- <u>Section 12.</u> <u>Police Power Finding</u>. The Town Council hereby finds, determines and declares that this ordinance is necessary and proper to provide for the safety, preserve the health, promote the prosperity, and improve the order, comfort and convenience of the Town of Breckenridge and the inhabitants thereof.
- <u>Section 13.</u> <u>Authority</u>. The Town Council hereby finds, determines and declares that it has the power to adopt this ordinance pursuant to the provisions of Section 31-15-401(1)(b) C.R.S., and the powers possessed by home rule municipalities in Colorado, including, but not limited to, Section 15.7 of the Breckenridge Town Charter entitled "Emergency Powers."
- Section 14. Emergency Declaration. The Town Council of the Town of Breckenridge hereby finds, determines and declares that an emergency exists and that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of public property, health, welfare, peace or safety for the reasons enumerated in the introductory paragraphs of this ordinance, which are incorporated into this Section 13 by reference. The Town Council further determines that the adoption of this ordinance as an emergency ordinance is in the best interest of the citizens of the Town of Breckenridge.

1	Section 15. Effective Date. Pursuant to Section 5.11 of the Breckenridge Town Charter
2 3	this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon adoption of this ordinance by the
3 4	affirmative votes of at least five (5) members of the Town Council.
5	Section 16. Publication of Ordinance. This ordinance shall be published in full within ten
6	(10) days after adoption, or as soon thereafter as possible, as required by Section 5.11 of the
7	Breckenridge Town Charter.
