Pre-Disaster Recovery Planning Guidance

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Room for the River Acquisition Program in Boulder County

In response to the 2013 flood event, in 2017-18, Boulder County Transportation completed an investigation into the feasibility of creating a long-term flood-related mitigation program that built on the efforts of the county's post-flood Voluntary Property Acquisition Program, also known as the "buy-out program."

Boulder County Article 19: Procedures Following Disasters

Boulder County's Article 19 regulations are part of the County's land use code and are meant to streamline the rebuilding process after a natural or human caused disaster. With activation of Article 19 procedures, modifications of the permitting and approval procedures allow property owners to rebuild in a timely, safe and responsible manner while encouraging redevelopment consistent with current regulations and the Comprehensive Plan.

Ensuring that people who are impacted by an event are able to access information in their language is important to ensuring recovery happens quickly. A Boulder County best practice is hiring an interpreter to help ensure information is available in English and Spanish throughout the recovery.
