Hoffman elected president of the Colorado Municipal League's Executive Board

DENVER, Colo. – Tuesday, July 1, 2025 – Lone Tree City Manager Seth Hoffman was elected president of the Colorado Municipal League (CML) Executive Board in Breckenridge on June 26 at CML's 103rd Annual Conference. Hoffman will serve a one-year term as president and represents the Board's medium population category (8,000 to 59,999). His term expires in June 2026, after which he will continue to serve as CML's Immediate Past President through June 2027.

Hoffman has served as city manager for the City of Lone Tree since 2013. As city manager, Hoffman provides professional leadership for Lone Tree's police, finance, economic development, administrative services, public works, arts center, and community development departments, and facilitates the work of city council by implementing all elements of the governing body's goals and policies.

Before becoming city manager, Hoffman served in various roles for Lone Tree including deputy city manager and economic development director, where he conducted several successful expansion, retention, and relocation negotiations on multiple high-profile projects. Prior to Lone Tree, Hoffman worked in the city manager's office in Grand Junction.

Hoffman has served on the CML Executive Board for the last three years and previously served in CML's Municipal Caucus and as a board member for the Colorado Smart Cities Alliance. He is an advocate for local decision making in the face of significant state challenges to local control.

The <u>CML Executive Board</u> is comprised of 21 municipal elected officials and staff members who are elected by the membership at CML's Annual Business Meeting. The Board is responsible for the overall finances, management, and policy direction of the League.
