Who are Coloradans with disabilities?







Disability Types & Conditions

- Mobility
- Cognition
- Independent living
- Hearing
- Vision
- Self-care

- Permanent
- Temporary
- Situational





Colorado's Digital-Based Divide

- As of 2019, there were 864,454 disabled adults in Colorado
- That is equal to 20% or 1 in 5





Aging in Colorado

- Between 2010 and 2015, Colorado's growth in its 65 plus population was 3rd fastest in the US
- Coloradans age 65 and older are the fastest growing age group in the state, and forecasts show that 1 in 5 Colorado residents will be over 65 by 2050



The Alphabet Soup of Accessibility

- ADA: Civil rights law applies to state and local governments, nonprofits and businesses
- 508: Federal law applies to federal agencies and departments
- W3C, WAI, WCAG: World Wide Web Consortium universal standards and guidelines
- Colorado's accessibility laws = WCAG 2.1 AA compliance





WCAG 2.1 AA

- Perceivable
- Operable
- Understandable
- Robust



Colorado Accessibility Compliance HB21-1110

- It is now a state civil rights violation for a government agency to exclude people with disabilities from receiving services or benefits because of lack of accessibility.
- Any Colorado government entity that doesn't meet OIT's web accessibility standards could be subject to injunctive relief, meaning a court order to fix the problem; actual monetary damages; or a fine of \$3,500 payable to the plaintiff, who must be someone from the disability community.





Colorado Accessibility Compliance

What You Can Do: Reactive

- Audit and inventory of all digital touchpoints
- Identify product owners, platform providers, content providers
- Contact platform providers
- Conduct assessment of digital touchpoints
- Develop list of recommended updates
- Apply updates
