





















Seattle: 5% or \$2.6 million cut will have to close most branch libraries two days a week

Cuyahoga: with 28 branches is facing a 30 percent cut

Pittsburgh: five of 19 branches will close, and a 23 percent cut in hours the remaining branches

Fresno: 80 part-time temporary library employees were recently let go; untold number of the roughly 280 full-time workers will be laid off




The Alternative • A taxing authority within the City • Revenue source is property taxes • Revenue dedicated for a defined purpose • City Council is the governing body • Assets remain part of the city • Employees remain city employees • Must be approved by voters in November






















LIBRARY SERVICE PROVISION

47% served by independent library districts

88 agencies serving populations under 50k

18 agencies serving populations over 50k

53% served by city/county library departments

83% served by agencies serving over 50k population

16% served by agencies serving under 50k population

Solution #1: LIBRARY DISTRICT Step 1: CITY FORMS ON OWN VOLITION BY RESOLUTION OR IN RESPONSE TO PETITION OR FOLLOWING VOTE

Library District Formation cont'

Step 2: MILL LEVY VOTER APPROVAL NECESSARY IF DESIGNATED LIBRARY MILL LEVY NOT PREVIOUSLY APPROVED



Library District Formation cont'

Step 3: IGA BETWEEN DISTRICT AND CITY
GOVERNING EMPLOYEE TRANSITION
AND REAL PROPERTY/BUILDINGS



General Improvement District

- Can be formed for Library Purposes
- Mill Levy Separate from City
- City Council sits as Ex Officio Board
- Can Form Advisory Board to Handle Day to Day Operations and Facilitate Statutory Compliance

Library District

Pros:

- Funded by library users/frees up general fund for fire, police, public works.
- Stable Funding Source via Mill Levy vs. Sales
 Tax = Long Range Planning
- Single Purpose District Directly Accountable to Taxpayers


Library District Pros... con't


- Reduced Workload on City Staff (HR, Legal, Finance, IT, Facilities Management)
- Potential Charge Back Revenue to City (in the event HR, Accounting are contracted for via IGA)
- Easier to Secure Taxpayer Support When They Can Serve on Board and Become Stewards of Taxpayer Funds


Library District Cons

- Potential Tax Increase if No Commensurate Lowering of City/Town Mill Levy
- City Council/Town Board No Longer Controls Library














Garfield County Public Library District

- County system since 1968
- 6 libraries
- District formed in 2007
- Won with 63% of the vote
- 1 mill of property tax for 20 years
- Quarter cent County sales tax
- Annual budget of \$2.9 million
- New facilities budget of \$26 million


How the Rifle Project began Civic neighbors Parking issues 3200 sf library building District formed (2007)



Joint Facility Pros

- Better use of tax dollar
 - Reduced construction costs
 - Reduced maintenance and operations cost
- New *identity*
- More space for plaza and parking
- One-stop shop for citizens
- Better for *community gatherings*
- Increased visual control/security
- Easier use of high tech tools
- Room for growth
- Maximize Green elements

Joint Facility Cons

- Slows the design/ construction documentation process
- Extended the library completion date
- Ownership issues
- Coordinating funding sources
- Who pays for what?
- Demands the desire to succeed from all parties

- 99 year rolling lease
- Shared parking
- Exterior maintenance
- Civic plaza
- Street improvements
- · Ability to add on later
- Cash contribution
- Vacation of 2nd Street
- Interim parking

DOLA

- 1.7 million

- Expanding both the Library and City Hall.
- Creating a downtown "square" or civic plaza.
 Revitalizing downtown Rifle.



Rifle Successes Since DOLA Award

- Named a Sustainable Main
- DOLA Planning grant awarded • Grand Opening of Centennial
- CacaLoco Compost opens at Energy Innovation Center
- Ute Theater Renovation receives an \$80,000 Gates Family Foundation grant plus a • Rifle Health & Wellness Center \$65,000 CDPHE award for asbestos abatement.
- \$800,000 US HUD/DOT Community Challenge Planning Grant award to SMSI communities for downtown/pedestrian/transit planning
- New 7-plex movie theater
- Pro-forma started with CMC for joint voc-tech center
 - begins operation in interim
