

using the screening level assessments, public water systems are encouraged to voluntarily develop a protection plan








## What is the statewide status of source water protection efforts?

- 226 source water protection (SWP) plans in CO
- 2.35 million people served by PWS with SWP plans
- financial and technical assistance provided to complete SWP plans (\$5,000 grant program)
- protection plans specifically identify GIS spatial information with regard to water supply areas
- Colorado Rural Water Association employees (6) working across the state on protection plans
- CDPHE and USFS have an MOU to collaborate on SWP
  areas

#### Management Approaches

- Emergency response cards
- · Call down lists
- Signage on roadways
- Security of water system
- · Water quality monitoring
- Municipal Ordinance
- Zoning regulations
- Master Planning language
- · Building networks, relationships, partnerships









### USFS and CDPHE MOU

- Active since September 2009, renewed for 5 years in 2014
- Public water systems benefit from a mutual agreement between agencies to protect water resources
- MOU outlines strategies to coordinate on protection efforts
- Strategies include: identify and designates municipal supply watersheds, collaborate and understand local protection planning efforts and how to integrate with these efforts
- · The agreement has accomplished: increase awareness, better spill/incident response, wildfire risk reduction, balance of oil and gas development, collaborative communication, effective updates of land use and forest management plans.









- Establishes a very identifiable collaborative approach and mutual commitments
- · Protection plan development partners get more support and are motivated to complete plans
- · Plans have more of a "shelf life"
- · MOU can be a framework for future administrations to follow





#### Highlights of MOU with Counties

Components (A + I + M)

- 1. Awareness ("A")
  - · Recognizes plan completed
  - County & public water system distribute plan to staff & agencies
  - \* Recognize shared responsibilities to protect water supplies





## Highlights of MOU with Counties

#### 2. Information Sharing ("I")



- Public water system provides updated geographic information system spatial data to County
- County refers all requests for data to public water system
- County may enter into data sharing agreement with Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment to obtain statewide data
- Public water system will share information & encourage input from county staff on plan implementation
- Public water system provides annual updates to County on implementation of source water protection plan

# How Can CML "AIM" for Source Water Protection?

#### Management ("M")

both parties agree to coordinate on management strategies to protect drinking water

- Acknowledge shared commitment to endorse drinking water protection
- CDPHE and CML should consider an MOU, similar to the USFS and County MOU



Establish a workgroup to design and draft consistent drinking water protection master planning language in planning documents and master plan Establish a consistent educational program about SWAP to Planning Managers, Executive CML members about the protection of local drinking water resource
